Pastoral Letter

by Kimberly Lord Arndt - From the Social Concerns Commission



“What if Heaven is what we are called to create here on Earth? What if our calling is to prepare a home where God wants to come and join us?”

What does it mean to be social concerned?

Most of us spend our days immersed in our own realities and the work of our family and friends. Even in a city as big as Chicago with all of its challenges, our networks and lives revolve around a relatively small circle of people.

Expanding our vision to encompass a larger group of people with different circumstances, needs and resources is empowering and important. This is the work of Social Concerns Commission representatives.

I recently heard a Biblical scholar speak on the Book of Revelation and how he felt many have interpreted the meaning of heaven incorrectly. He went on to explain that Heaven is not a place that we attain through our good deeds nor a place to escape to from our current world beset with troubles. What if Heaven is what we are called to create here on Earth? What if our calling is to prepare a home where God wants to come and join us?

I love this vision – not because I think we’re anywhere close to having created a place God would want to call home – but because it gives meaning and purpose to the important work of helping our neighbors, next door and around the world.

The Social Concerns Commission is part of the framework established by the parish transformation project established a few years back. Our committee works toward social justice goals and focuses on international, national, regional, local efforts. In the coming months, you’ll learn more about each of our areas of focus: Uganda, the Greater Chicago Food Depository, St. Mary of the Lake and St. Thomas of Canterbury.

Scripture Reflection by David Heimann, Pastoral Associate

This weekend in our bulletin we are highlighting the work of our *Social Concerns Commission*. I've always chuckled a bit about the name of this commission. It is the same name that several other parishes use for the organizing body that supports outreach to those on the margins, but here at Saint Andrew (*which is known as a fun and jovial place that likes to party*), more than once I've thought that "Social Concerns" sound more like a "*party planning committee*" rather than advocates for the poor and outcast.

Without any foresight into the matter, we're highlighting the Social Concern Commission's work on the same weekend in which we hear the Wedding Feast in Cana in the Gospel. Talk about a social concern! I mean, there is a party that almost went bust because there wasn't enough wine! Something must be done! (*Special note: In my 4th year of working at Saint Andrew, I have yet to experience a gathering where we ran short of wine.*)

At first, the two initiatives seem mismatched, but on further evaluation, they compliment each other extremely well.

Jesus came to show us the love of God and since we are social creatures, that love is always about justifying the incongruities found in society. That means where there is sadness, Jesus brings joy. Where there is grief, Jesus brings consolation. Where there is doubt,

knowledge. And where there is a wedding that has turned sour, he makes it an all-out gala!

Too often we put these things at odds. How can we celebrate when there are people in poverty in the world? How can we find joy when so many people live in despair?

But this is the wrong dialectic to hold. It never was and never is "either/or." Jesus did not seek to privilege the merriment of a wedding feast and ignore the outcasts. His justice holds both as co-equal. His concern is that all people should enjoy the fullness of life, all people should be able to raise a glass and toast to love and human relationship. All people deserve dignity! All people deserve a party!

If Saint Andrew is known for throwing a good party and we have parishioners who host the best soirees, that's a good thing! We are not meant to be dreary thugs. But the party does not end with us. Our social concern should be that everyone, those at our sister parish in Uganda, those who need food and come to one of our partnering food pantries, those who need a home, those who need an education, all of these and more... they all deserve a party with the best wine. That is the true miracle of the Wedding Feast of Cana. Not that Jesus wanted to improve a party for the few, but the plan he had to choose us as ambassadors to give all people the chance to celebrate the joys of life.

The Church, Community in the Spirit

The Church is a community - a community of people who profess the same belief in one God, led by the same Spirit, with a common mission: to proclaim the Good News of Jesus Christ's redeeming sacrifice. "We are all one..." but are we all the same? Yes, and no. We are all members of the Body of Christ. We also serve different functions in the church, as the laity, religious members, and clergy. Ideally, a vocation is chosen because an individual shares their gifts while following the promptings of the Holy Spirit. For example, someone may be a great public speaker and choose to become a priest, while another person with the same gift might become a lawyer defending social justice issues. No matter what we choose, we are called to offer the best of *ourselves* to make the world a better place for *everyone else*.

2018 Social Concerns Commission - Year in Review

Through your generosity and the work of many parishioners, the Spirit continues to thrive as we reach out to help those in need in our local community, nationally, and around the world. We celebrate this hard work to bring Christ's message of hope and caring to the poor and marginalized. The following agencies are among those partners that the parish supported in 2018:

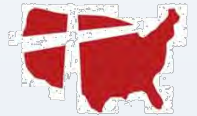
INTERNATIONAL

- One Heart Uganda's goal is to change lives through education and to create a special bond between people in the United States and Uganda. In 2018, 130 students were sponsored, 130 sponsor care packages were delivered, and there were 8 university or trade school graduates. In July, ten Chicagoans travelled to Uganda to meet the students and form deeper connections and a new solar well was installed.



NATIONAL

- During Lent, we supported The Catholic Extension, a 110-year-old society that supports dioceses in the United States that are geographically isolated, often without regular Masses and access to the sacraments.
- Through second collections, the parish supported Catholic Charities and the Catholic Campaign for Human Development.



REGIONAL

- The Greater Chicago Food Depository is Chicago's Food Bank, striving to end hunger in partnership with 700 agencies and programs in Cook County. In 2018, 113 parishioners volunteered 331 hours, repacking enough food to make approximately 19,210 meals.
- Through the Baby Bottle project, we support The Women's Centers of Greater Chicagoland, which supports thousands of women each year who are facing a crisis pregnancy.

LOCAL

- We supported our local sharing parish, St. Thomas of Canterbury in Uptown, with donations to their food pantry and soup kitchen, including summertime food for kids, a cargo van of food for Thanksgiving and a 25 dozen ears of fresh corn in July. In addition, as-needed projects such as clothing, blankets, and other needs are supported by the parish.
- Our Giving Tree project provides warm socks, hats, mittens and scarves to students from St. Thomas of Canterbury and St. Mary of the Lake each winter. St. Andrew families have helped keep more than 550 students warm through this program.

This is just a sampling of the agencies and programs that are supported by parishioners. We also serve our neighbors through St. Vincent de Paul and countless hours of volunteer work at local nursing homes, shelters, soup kitchens, and food banks. **Thank you** for your incredible efforts in 2018, and may God continue to bless your efforts in 2019.

Young Adult Mission Trip

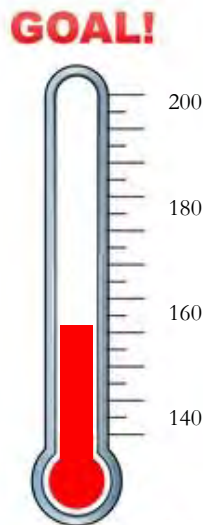
