Pastoral Letter by Deacon Eric Sorensen



"Mary said, Yes!
She remembered
and freely
consented.
Indeed, let us too
remember the
impossible
this Christmas,
and give our full
and free consent."

When we read Scripture we find a variety of genres of literature. There is storytelling, historical accounts, songs of thanksgiving and sorrow, writings of wisdom, messages from God, and various teachings. We are also confronted with passages that are beyond understanding, incomprehensible, that escapes our reality. These are written in God's language, the language of Love, and they show 'nothing is impossible for God.'

Luke's Gospel reading is one such passage of God speaking to us in his Love. The Archangel Gabriel is sent to Mary, "Hail, full of grace! The Lord is with you." Mary is found in God's favor and receives the gift of a son, the Son of God. And she given the knowledge of Elizabeth's pregnancy - the impossible made possible. She responds and Gabriel departs, leaving Mary in her reality, our reality, the physical reality of our lives.

In Loyola's Advent retreat, "When They Saw The Star," Kevin Pease asks the question - *Why Mary?* Why of all the women mentioned in Scriptures does Mary stand out amongst the poor and humble of the Lord, that through her the new plan of salvation is established? Is it because of the grace by which she was conceived, immaculately prepared to give her free submission to God? Yes! As the *Catechism of the Catholic Church* (CCC) #490 states, "in order for Mary to be able to give the free consent of her faith, it was necessary that she be wholly borne by God's grace."

Yet, Kevin suggests something more - Mary Remembers!

Mary too was born into a world of good and evil. She too was tempted by the root of sin; of not feeling worthy. All her life she resisted this temptation and always remembered the Love in which she was created, in God's Love. In doing this she shows us the significant value of God's creatures; that they are created to receive the Creator! God wanted that "free cooperation of a creature that remembers," -- Mary. Her free will to contribute to the coming of life for all of us, through her son, our Lord Jesus Christ. (CCC 488)

Why Us? Yes, we too are tempted to forget the Love of God, to be persuaded to think we are unworthy. But we are all conceived in his Love, without which we would not be. Our creation has already established our worth. He has created us in his own image and brought us into his friendship. All he wants to do is hold our hearts; but will we let him?

Mary said, Yes! She remembered and freely consented. Indeed, let us too remember the impossible this Christmas, and give our full and free consent. "Behold, I am *the maidservant/the manservant* of the Lord. May it be done to me according to your word!"

Celebrating Advent Together

Ask a typical first grader about the liturgical year, and you will likely hear about Christmas, Easter, and Ordinary (or "oh, ya know.. just the *regular*") time. There is usually some confusion about the difference between Advent and Lent. What is very clear to these young people is that both are a period of intense waiting... particularly when it comes to Christmas. So how can we celebrate advent in a special way at home?

For some, taking turns lighting each candle of an advent wreath indicates that the weeks are ticking by. Advent calendars are all over grocery stores, containing scripture passages or small treats, giving us a foretaste of the sweetness of Christmas. If you attend mass at Saint Andrew or have watched a live stream recently, you may have noticed the large advent wreath in front of the Mary altar. We can think of this as our parish family's wreath!

Others may have a nativity in their home, and traditions vary from family to family about who appears in the nativity at a certain time. Many hide baby Jesus in a special place until Christmas Eve or Christmas Day (don't forget where he is!). It can also be fun for your three kings to go on an adventure through your home as they follow the star to Bethlehem, arriving on Epiphany to celebrate Jesus with gold, frankincense and myrrh.

Advent is a season of anticipation and a season of Hope. The coming of Jesus in Advent is bound up with the reason for his birth - to be Savior of the World. His coming is threefold: We celebrate Jesus's first coming in the Nativity, live in expectation of his second coming at the end of time, as well as rejoice in his presence in our midst today as risen Lord.

However you celebrate Advent, allow yourself to live in the reason for THIS season.
